THE SITE OF JESUS' DEATH, BURIAL AND RESURRECTION - THE CHURCH OF THE HOLY SEPULCHRE







After Jewish revolts against the Romans' occupation, the Romans were keen to erase all memory both of the Jews and of the early Christians who had continued to visit the place of Jesus' death, burial and resurrection in Jerusalem. To do this, the Romans built over this site a temple dedicated to Aphrodite. Ironically, they confirmed for all time knowledge of where Jesus was crucified, died and rose.

In the 4th century, the first Christian Roman Emperor Constantine and his mother Helena visited the site and ordered the construction of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre - dedicated about 335 CE. Since that time, Jerusalem has been invaded by diverse rulers: the (eastern) Roman Empire, the Byzantine Empire until 637; the Rashidun Caliphate, the Umayyad and Abbasid Caliphates, the Fatimid Caliphate, the Crusader Kingdom of Jerusalem (1099–1187), the Ayyubid Dynasty, the Mamluk Sultanate, the Ottoman Empire (1517–1917) and the British Mandate (1917–1948). 1948 to the present is called the Modern Era. This Church has been destroyed twice (in 614 and 1009) and was renovated in a major way by the Crusaders in 1099. These changes explain much of what we see there.

Since the 11th century, the site has been jointly managed by the Greek Orthodox, Armenian Apostolic, Roman Catholic, and the Coptic, Syrian and Ethiopian Orthodox Churches. The 'Status Quo' agreement for their sharing was formalized first by the Ottomans in 1767. Still today, these diverse ethnic and religious traditions can be assertive in holding onto their allotted spaces and practices within the Church, because they value the site as the place of Jesus' death, burial and resurrection.

Two surprising legacies of the Ottomans' leadership are visible daily. Firstly, for the sake of neutrality, even centuries later, the responsibility for opening the Church each morning and locking it each night is still in the hands of two Muslim families: the Nuseibeh and Joudeh Al-Husseini families. Secondly, a wooden ladder has been leaning against a window of above the entrance to the Church since at least the 18th century. Keen not to upset the 'Status Quo', no-one has dared to move it, making it a symbol of the Church's complex history in the unique cultural and inter-faith tapestry of Jerusalem.
